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Are you ready to be Bewitched by Orchids?


MOS' 27th Annual Show and Sale is set for October 30 (setup) through November 2, 2008 at Tower Hill Botanic Garden, Boylston MA.

Tricks of the Trade – Adjustable Bloom Stakes

Cypripedium Experiment

In 2007, Ron Burch (http://www.gardensatposthill.com/) came to an MOS meeting and gave a talk on woodland slipper orchids and their culture. Although I was unable to attend, the possibility of growing such low maintenance plants was quite intriguing. I already had enough orchids that require artificial lighting and time-intensive watering during the cooler months. I got onto the email list of the Vermont Ladyslipper Company (http://www.vtladyslipper.com/), and by the fall of 2007, I received their message notifying me of their available plants. I took the plunge and order four Cypripedium reginae plants. As you may already know, these plants are expensive. Several weeks after mailing the check, I received four plants wrapped in bags full of moist vermiculite. More specifically, I received four root masses. The plants were dormant and with cold weather approaching, they were ready for planting. I made a trip to Lesco in Waltham and purchased a couple bags of Turface. Following Ron's recommend-dations, I dug up a 6' x 4' foot area near my house that gets good morning light but not the bright rays of the afternoon. Once the soil was removed to a depth of about ten inches, I mixed the Turface with sand, vermiculite, perlite, and pine straw, and filled the area. The root masses were planted about 1 inch below the surface making sure the roots were spread out. Apparently the goal is to spread the roots horizontally without getting them more than an inch or two below the surface.



As the cold, drying winds of winter approached, I covered the bed with several inches of pine straw. As New Englanders know well, winter stays for quite awhile. By mid March, I removed the layer of pine straw. I was hoping that critters had not dined on the roots during the long winter. Inspecting the bed became a weekly event, and by mid-April,

I was preparing myself for the reality that this was not meant to be. I have heard the stories that this is often a hit-or-miss proposition, and I figured that I would eventually be

performing a postmortem sometime in the late spring or early summer – assuming that there was anything left to examine.

One day in late May, after the weekly visits to the bed had come to an end, I swung by and noticed what appeared to be four growths emerging from the bed. Since I had previously marked the position of the roots with small wooden skewers, I was cautiously optimistic that these



emerging plants were not just weeds. As of early June, the four cigar-shaped bundles of leaves were about six inches in height. Ultimately one plant bloomed, and before the three others could follow suit, a hailstorm arrived in late June. The four plants were shredded and I must wait until next spring to see if there is any hope for these plants. Based on some discussions over the Internet with fellow cyp. enthusiasts, I am cautiously optimistic about the future of these hardy plants.
